### [Infertility and PTSD: The Uncharted Storm, Joanna Flemmons, LCSW \(2018\)](#)

Summary: The book provides fictional case examples of trauma and PTSD. The book provides trauma psychoeducation, the neuroscience of trauma and its impact on changing cognitions and regulating anxiety. The book provides research about the changing physiology with chronic trauma while providing practical evidence-based suggestions and treatment pathway considerations for trauma-informed therapy. The published research studies about infertility and PTSD are also cited/credited in the book

In Taking Baby Steps Jody Lynee Maderia takes readers inside the infertility experience, from dealing with infertility-related emotions to forming treatment relationships with medical professionals and confronting difficult medical decisions. Based on hundreds of interviews, this book investigates how women, men, and medical professionals

negotiate infertility's rocky terrain to create life and build families--a journey across personal, medical, legal and ethical minefields that can test mental and physical health, friendships and marriages, spirituality, and financial security.

Healing Mind, Healthy Woman: Using the Mind/Body Connection to Manage Stress and Take Control of Your Life (1997)

Although this is not a book exclusively for individuals with infertility, there is one chapter devoted exclusively to infertility and there are numerous examples from Ali's infertility patients. The focus of the book is teaching mind/body skills, including cognitive-behavioral and relaxation strategies.

Six Steps to Increased Fertility: An Integrated Medical and Mind/Body Approach to Promote Conception (2000) (co-authored with Drs. Barbieri and Loughlin)

This may be a bit outdated medically but the mind/body sections are still effective.

Self-Nurture: Learning to Care for Yourself as Effectively as You Care for Everyone Else (2001)

This is aimed at all women who struggle with meeting their own needs. There are numerous stories of women included as well as many cognitive-behavioral strategies.

Conquering Infertility: Dr. Alice Domar's Mind/Body Guide to Enhancing Fertility and Coping with Infertility (2004)

This book is aimed at women struggling to get pregnant, whether or not in treatment. It contains dozens of patient stories as well as numerous cognitive-behavioral and relaxation strategies. It is a very hands on skills acquisition book.

Be Happy Without Being Perfect: How to Break Free From the Perfection Deception (2008)

This book is aimed at women who struggle with achieving perfection in many areas of their life, including body image, parenting, their home, and their relationships.

Live a Little (2009) (co-authored with Dr. Susan Love)

This is aimed at all women, not just those with infertility. The aim of the book is to educate women about what the research actually shows in terms of the impact of lifestyle habits on our health.

Finding Calm for the Expectant Mom (2016)

Although not aimed specifically at women who have conceived after infertility, the book is meant for women who are experiencing anxiety or distress while pregnant. It is comprised of numerous stress reducing strategies, with a cognitive-behavioral focus.

**Reproductive Trauma: Psychotherapy with Infertility and Pregnancy Loss Clients (APA, 2011)** This can be thought of as a kind of handbook for therapists in working with this population, and provides theoretical constructs as well as practical advice in clinicians.

Noonan, Jen (2015) *In Due Time. A journey Through Infertility, Loss and Embracing the Unknown.* Denver: Mission Bay Press

*In Due Time* chronicles Jen's initial difficulty to conceive her son followed by the most physically and emotionally demanding time trying to expand her family. Intimate details of infertility testing and medication through failed attempts at pregnancy, in vitro attempts and embryo transfers are divulged. An emotional mixture of hope, defeat, success, and loss depicts her lengthy struggle to embrace the unknown.

Eichberg, Carrie (2017) Building My Family: A Story of Egg Donation and Surrogacy.

This book is aimed at heterosexual couples wanting to explain to their children their birth story. It is for children born through both surrogacy and egg donation.
